However, ambition itself is not necessarily a rat race. Working hard toward meaningful goals can provide satisfaction, purpose, and financial security. The expression becomes appropriate when competition and achievement seem endless, stressful, or disconnected from personal values. Two people may have equally demanding careers, yet only one may feel trapped in the rat race. The important distinction is whether a person controls the pursuit of success or feels controlled by it.

The image of rats racing for a reward emphasizes constant movement without meaningful progress.
